

### Timeline Margriet Adelheide Wolff (**Grietje**) Wolff

Grietje's Age	Date	Event
	1902	Johan Franz Jozeph Wolff and Adelheide Cornelia Bleijs (1878 - 1951) marry on 8 January in Soest
	1902	son, Willibrordus August Anthonius Wolff (1902 - ?), is born on 9 December in Watergraafsmeer
0	1907	daughter, Margriet Adelheide Wolff (Grietje) is born on 6 September in Amsterdam
1	1908	parents divorce in November in Utrecht
2	1909	Grietje's father, Johan Franz Jozeph Wolff (1875-1909), commits suicide
3	1910	Mother marries Cornelis ter Poorten (1877 - 1945) in April in Rijswijk, The Netherlands
9	1916	The family lives in San Francisco to facilitate the business interests of Cees ter Poorten.
13	1920	Step-father returns to head office of the KPM in Netherlands. Presumably the family returns with him.
15-17	1922 - 1923	Step-father voyages to Asia, a 'studie-reis', visiting Netherlands-Indies, Australia and Japan. Presumably this is when Grietje's mother traveled with her husband.
15 - 17?	1922-23?	It seems plausible that this was the period when Grietje and her younger half sister lived in a boarding house in Switzerland [and may have been when she wrote so many letters to her mother, as mentioned on the genealogical website]
18-19?	1923 - 24?	whole family? moves to Amsterdam
19 - 25?	1924 - 30?	Grietje studies nursing in the Prinsengracht Hospital in Amsterdam and cultivates a friendship with a fellow student that will last her whole life. This may have been when she met the writer, Aya Zikken.
25-29	1930 - 33?	Grietje meets the Hernhutter 'sisters' in Zeist and comes in contact with the VEM and the Evangelical Brotherhood.
27	1933 - 1939	Grietje is sent to Indonesia by the 'Raad voor de Zending van de Nederlandse Hervormde Kerk', the Dutch mission in Oegstgeest, The Netherlands. She started

		her career in the first Christian hospital on Java, Rumah Sakit Keristen Mojowarno, working in the TB sanatorium 'Wonosalam' (higher up and cooler), where she cultivated a friendship with a Javanese TB patient. She learns Malay and Javanese.
28	1935	Grietje's step-father becomes Director of KPM
33	1940	Grietje returns to The Netherlands on leave
	1940 - 1945	Grietje spends some time with Dr. B. Ch Ledebouer, head of the Epilepsie Institute, Meer en Bosch near Haarlemmerhout (later Heemstede). She spends time also with her nursing friend.
	1945	Grietje's stepfather, C. ter Poorten, dies
	1945 - 1948	Because it was impossible to return to Java (due to the freedom fighting in Indonesia), Grietje went to Lake Santani in Irian Jaya and worked in 'Joka'.
	1948	Grietje leaves on furlough to The Netherlands by ship. There were 4 births on board and she regretted not having had training in obstetrics
41	1948	Grietje took a crash course in obstetrics from Dr. Pruijs, but it was not a diploma course.
42	1949?	Grietje returned to Indonesia, first to Gereja Sekitar Muria, near the Muria mountain, the mission terrain of the Baptists
		Grietje shifts to Kupang, on island Timor
		Grietje moves to Alor to become the director of the hospital in Kalabahi. The doctor visited every 6 weeks.
46	25/4/1953	Grietje was bestowed a Gold Medal in the Order of Oranje Nassau for Nurse of First Class. She received notification of it while she was still in Kalabahi, Alor.
46	1953	Return to The Netherlands?
47-49	1954 - Dec. 1956	Transfer to North Sumatra to work in the mission hospital in Kaban Jahe, Karo Batak region.
49 -50	1956-57	Transfer to Bethesda Hospital, Saribu Dolok, North Sumatra, with the Dutch mission (NZG, Nederlandsche Zendeling Genootschap). Among other things she taught a group of nurses to play the recorder.

52-56	1959-63	On 19 June, Grietje is sent out by the Rheinische Missionsgesellschaft to nurse in Okombahe and Tsumeb, Namibia.
56	1963	Pension. Grietje makes her home on Clivialaan 6, 2106 CG Heemstede, The Netherlands
59	1966	Grietje studies the Simalungun (Batak, North Sumatra) language in Tübingen, Germany, with Sarmedi Purba
59	1966	Back in The Netherlands, Grietje helps set up Yayasan Marsiurupan together with Dr. Abraham Go, Henk Criete, and Sister Karolentina to address water shortages in the area around Saribu Dolok, North Sumatra
60	1965-1970	Lutheran World Federation (LWF) recruits Grietje to work in their Health and Community Development programme. She works with Zr. Karolentina in Bethesda hospital until her age forces her to take her pension (FLO = Functionele Leeftijds Ontslag)
63	1970	Grietje returns to The Netherlands for good. Her pension is from the Dutch Mission (Zending der Nederlands Hervormde Kerk) in Oegstgeest.
	1975	Zr. Wolf visits Düsseldorf from The Netherlands for the birth of Dr. Sarmedi Purba's daughter, Christina
	1976	Grietje's photo collection reveals that she visited Bali, Toraja and Minahasa
	1978	Grietje attends an anniversary celebration in Bethesda Hospital at Christmas time.
73, 74	1980, 1982	Grietje visits Indonesia with Aya Zikken. (Aya Zikken, daughter of a school teacher, was born in Medan.) They visited missionaries in the Batak Area where they met Sandra Niessen in Pematang Siantar and Tarutung. They also traveled to Minangkabau
77	1984	Grietje celebrates the 50th anniversary of her mission work. Dr. Go delivered a speech for the occasion.
78, 79	1985, 1986	Grietje visits Indonesia frequently. She brought back a beautiful Batak textile from Uluan for Sandra Niessen. She also visited

		Alor and Bali and Timor. In Alor, she stayed with 'de mantri', the nurse.
88	1995	Apparently she went to Alor at this age
89	12 July 1996	Fatal heart attack at home in Heemstede
89	13 July 1996	She passes away in hospital
89	17/7/1996	funeral - presided over by minister Arno Tim, in Haarlem. He was half Vietnamese, through his father, and half Dutch, through his mother, and originally from Germany. The Cremation took place in the Driehuis-Westerveld crematorium close to Santpoort Dr. Go spoke at her cremation (recorded on video and audio tape)
